
OF SAINT MARY



**NOVEMBER, 2019 • THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY** 

Twenty five years ago, a group of unlikely collaborators sat down to talk. They met with a germ of an idea — to celebrate the holiness and beauty of the Icon as well as a common adoration and love of an art form whose sole purpose is to direct one's mind and heart to the Divine. Under the common umbrella of the icon, the friendship between the Russian Orthodox Church and the Roman Catholic Church began with a meeting between Johan van Parys, Carol Frenning, and Iconographer Debra Korluka. They had the idea of celebrating the Icon in November (traditionally the Catholic month of remembrance of the dead), and so it began in 1995 with a small display of Icons in the St. John the Baptist Chapel. As the number of Icons grew over the years, so did the people involved, and so did the festival. The festival eventually came to be opened by a special Icon procession during an early November liturgy, into the holiest space of The Basilica, the sanctuary. And here we are, twenty five years later.

at The Basilica of Saint Mary in downtown Minneapolis.


#### **Icon Procession**
